### **Elections**

Local Government Elections for Parish and Town Councils took place on the 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2013. Nine wards were uncontested and Councillors Draper, Ginger, J Newbold, Parry, Perks, Pound, Smithers and Toop were elected out of 15 seats.

Six Members were co-opted on the 17<sup>th</sup> June 2013; Councillors Cobley, Holcombe, Jones, Kemp, Lyle and Mold.

Following the resignations of two Councillors from Clee View Ward, Councillors S Newbold and Sheward were elected on 22<sup>nd</sup> August 2013, replacing T. Pound and M. Phillips.

A further resignation from Councillor Toop left a vacancy in Whitcliffe Ward and Councillor Tim Gill was elected on 13<sup>th</sup> March 2014.

### **Financial Information**

The annual audit will take place in May and the Annual Return will be available for inspection by residents from 21<sup>st</sup> July 2014. ### **KEY EVENTS 2013-2014**



*Mayor Making 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2013*– Mayor Making marked the beginning of the ceremonial year by welcoming newly elected Mayor, Councillor J Smithers as the Mayor for 2013-14.

Eight Civic Awards were presented in recognition of excellence in the voluntary sector and services to the community to: Alan and Cath Walker, Colin Reeve and Amanda Pope, David Davies, Friends of Whitcliffe Common, Lin Dalton, Norman Wright, the late Parade Marshall, David Lewis and Rick Alexander.



*Mayor's Chosen Charities* – the Mayor chose two charities for 2012/13 which were announced at Mayor Making and these were the Royal British Legion (Ludlow Branch) and First Responders.

The Mayor organised an Easter Dance on the 18<sup>th</sup> April 2014, with proceeds being split equally between both charities. Car parking at Stone House on special weekends including Festivals and Christmas



Lights Switch also raised money.



*Mayor's Sunday Service 26<sup>th</sup> May 2013* – Mayors Sunday was led by the Venerable Colin Williams at St Laurence Church. A parade of uniformed organisations led by the late former Parade Marshall Davie Lewis and Ludlow Concert Band drew crowds on Broad Street where the Mayor thanked and dismissed the Parade.



#### Guildhall

Since the Town Council has occupied the Guildhall minor changes have been made to accommodate staff and Councillors. These include the relocation of the dock in the main chamber and a planning application has been made for a Town Council name plaque to be applied to the outside of the building and listed building consent granted to enable the Chamber to accommodate more people.



# **Developments/Projects**

#### **Buttercross Heritage Interpretation Centre**

Market Town Revitalisation Programme Funding of £120,000 from Shropshire Council was granted on 27 August 2013.

The works to refurbish the grade I listed building on English Heritage's At Risk Register began immediately

The internal timber frame walls have been constructed ready for new plumbing and electrical works. The existing poorly adhered plaster

work was removed and lathes respaced and rafters strengthened to create a more robust structure for the new plaster. It is estimated that plastering the ceiling will take up to 8 weeks to complete.


Remedial work was needed to the steps leading to the Buttercross covered market area the work was completed by Stuart Preece and Sons in March 2014.

Ludlow Town Council are currently rebidding for money from Shropshire Council to complete the refurbishment work.

### **Boxing Club**

Wheeler Road Boxing Club & Community Centre is a collaborative project between Ludlow Town Council, Ludlow Amateur Boxing Club, Shropshire Council and Shropshire Housing Association. This project would not have been possible without the generosity of local companies gifting materials and many local residents and trades people volunteering their skills and time. Thanks to all those involved.

The old Boxing Club Plans was demolish in 2011.



On 27 September 2012 the ground braking ceremony took place. Subsequently one hundred and twenty tonnes of soil were removed for the ground works under the watchful eye of site manager, Colin Richards MBE, former Historic Environment Manager at Shropshire Council. The steel framed brick building is a community building in the best sense of the word. Local businesses gifted



#### Ludlow Market



Ludlow Market trades for 6 days a week in the summer months and 7 days a week in the month before Christmas. The hard work of the Council staff and traders as well as the support of customers generated good income for 2013-2014.

The Market offers a variety of



regular and specialist markets to include continental, local produce, antiques, crafts, books and gifts along with a medieval market to coincide with the Medieval Fayre in November and also a food based market in September to coincide with the Food Festival held in the Castle.

### **AMENITY AREAS**

Ludlow Town Council Direct Labour Force cares for and maintains public amenity areas in Ludlow. Their work includes mowing, strimming, gardening, maintenance, litter collection and watering. The main areas include:

Ludlow Town Council takes care of the public toilets at Castle Street Car park, Smithfield car park, Henley Road Cemetery and the Linney Riverside Park.

The Town Council has a continuing programme of improvements in the Town. Smithfield toilets have been fitted with automatic closers and the Linney toilets are due for refurbishment.

#### Henley Road Cemetery

The Cemetery was opened in 1914 and therefore commemorating 100 years. The Cemetery is cared for by Ludlow Town Council's Direct Labour Force ensuring the area looks its very best all year round.

#### **Memorial Benches**



Ludlow Town Council receives occasional requests from families who would like to commemorate a loved one in a practical and public way with a bench.

Benches also provide a service to the wider community offering a chance for rest, and if the location permits, quiet reflection.

Memorial benches are situated in the cemetery, Dinham Gardens and the Events Square.

**Calendar of Events** - Each year Ludlow Town Council publishes Ludlow Calendar of Events. 100,000 copies are distributed throughout the West Midlands.

**Street Trading** – The Town Council became the Street Trading Authority in April 2011. The Town Council formed its own Policy and the income for 2012-13 was £8,371. Two pitches close to the market were transferred from Street Trading to the market which enables a smoother operation. Therefore income for 2013-14 was £6,608.090.
