



FROM THE MAYOR

I'd like to welcome you to our festive edition of the Buttercross Bulletin. The Civic life of a councillor, and especially the Mayor, is busy throughout the year and the Council has been able to progress matters despite the economic restrictions of which we are all more aware.

As Mayoress and Mayor, Pam and I are delighted to have been involved in over forty events in and around Ludlow. We have been able to recognise successes and

encourage groups to continue with activities that are integral to life in Ludlow. We have also been proud to represent Ludlow in other parts of Shropshire, to establish contacts elsewhere and help promote our Town.

The matter I'd like to draw your special attention to in this edition are the results of the consultation that has informed and supported the Town Plan. The process has been led by Councillor Susan McCormack. There have been numerous and varied discussions that have lead to a working document, which will be produced before the New Year. We will review progress and track performance on a six monthly basis. This will allow the Council to incorporate new aspects that emerge as we progress towards 2014. One such emerging aspect, which is very important to Ludlow, is the newly announced provision of £400,000 towards capital projects from Shropshire Council. These funds provide the Town Council and residents with new opportunities and we will ask your views on what will benefit Ludlow most. Another important aspect of the Town Plan is Youth provision, including those who are disadvantaged, the issue has featured strongly in discussions with organisations and members of the public. We will be exploring how we can turn concerns about low employment prospects and training, housing shortfall and lack of activities for youngsters into practical proposals.

The aim of this newsletter is to communicate and to inform. A new feedback form will appear in every issue for your use to let us know what you think and how you feel, please let us know. There are other very effective ways to achieve feedback and I was very impressed by the wonderful and diverse views expressed by people I have met on the Market Square and in Tower Street during the Town Plan consultation. As a council, we will hold more such events in future.'








Working for Ludlow



Ludlow Town Council is involved in many aspects of life in Ludlow:

Ludlow Market The Town Council owns the market square and employs a market manager (also projects officer), who is also the projects officer, who runs the regular markets on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday and lets the market to other organisations for Local Produce Markets, Antique and Flea markets, and special festival markets throughout the year.



Henley Road Cemetery The Town Council is the burial authority at Henley Road Cemetery. The administration of the cemetery is run by the Cemetery Officer, who is also the Communications Officer. The multi-skilled grounds maintenance team keeps the cemetery looking respectfully tidy, and also works in many other areas of Ludlow.

Maintenance of Amenity Areas & Grass Cutting The Grounds Team work in many prominent areas of Ludlow including The Linney Riverside Park, Wheeler Road Skate Park, Castle Gardens, St John's Gardens and planting for tubs in Ludlow Town Centre, to help keep our beautiful town looking its best!

Street lighting & Christmas lights Town Council is responsible for 500 street lights and is working towards replacing all lamps with energy efficient LED ones, which have a long life span and save 75% of electricity costs.

The Town Council is actively working to improve signage in Ludlow, as well as providing:

- Litter bins in the market and other areas of town
- Bus shelter in Mill Street
- Allotments, Project Support Grants
- Civic Events such as Remembrance Sunday, Christmas Party & Mayfair
- Planning, Parking & Traffic Consultee for Ludlow
- Tourism Ludlow Calendar of Events, Youth Events

The Town Clerk is the key administrative figure in the Town Council, who is supported by a versatile finance, and admin assistants.

The Town Clerk advises on legal matters and manages the many and varied tasks undertaken by the Council. The Clerk is the fulcrum between the Councillors and staff to ensure effective working, as well as liaising with outside organisations to offer assistance, or represent the Town Council's perspective on local matters.

Looking to the Future toilets The town council would like to help improve Ludlow. We are currently discussing taking over the provision and maintenance of toilets from Shropshire Council



Ludlow Town Council Keeping Ludlow Lovely

Rain or shine the Town Council's Grounds Team of four permanent and one seasonal staff maintain Henley Road Cemetery, Castle Gardens, The Garden of Rest, Wheeler Road Recreation area and Skate Park, Fishmore Recreation Area, Houseman Crescent Recreation Area, St Thomas Chapel, St John's Garden by the town wall, and The Linney Riverside Park. The team also maintain bus shelters, responding to emergency callouts to make play areas safe, and cordon off damaged street lights, and put up Christmas Lights.

Henley Road Cemetery occupies a site of approx. 1.5 hectares, and throughout the growing season, the seventeen grassed areas are cut on a rota to ensure the cemetery is tidy and maintains an appropriate sense of dignity.

In other areas, the grounds team undertake weekly fifty point checks to ensure the cleanliness and safety of Town Council's amenity and play areas. Members of the grounds team also undertake cleaning duties at the end of each market day. At civic events, Grounds staff's preparations and stewarding helps to ensure the smooth running of events such as Remembrance Sunday, Mayor's Sunday & Mayor Making.

The organisational structure of the Town Council helps to ensure effective working. The grounds team and office administration staff's priorities and workload are informed by the decisions of Council Committees and Full Council, although the overall delivery of all services is managed by the Town Clerk, who is the hub of the council for both councillors and staff.

The result of Heart of England award was a closely guarded secret right up until the last minute at the awards ceremony in September. The sweet smell of success for Ludlow was the reward for dedicated effort and hard work from the Ludlow in Bloom Committee chaired by Jim Smithers.

Ludlow in Bloom works closely with the Ludlow Town Council (LTC) staff who plant up the beds and maintain grassed recreation areas in Ludlow. Success is no stranger to Ludlow in Bloom who have also received Gold in 2006, 2007 & 2009.

TOWN CLERK'S REPORT Time to make changes for the better




Reset bell (originally from St Leonards Church Corve Street, Ludlow) and hammer, which before it can be rung will have to spring loaded to protect the bell.

High above the centre of Ludlow refurbishment works to the Grade I listed Buttercross (c.1746) are progressing well. The sensitive restoration work is being carried out by crafts persons from Treasure & Son, Ludlow, with Architects Nick Joyce and Alan Simcox overseeing the specification of works, and John Tiernan from English Heritage offering expert advice throughout the project.

The Clock is also being restored by Smiths of Derby as it suffered from water damage in recent years. Inspection also revealed potentially dangerous cracks in the glass of the clock face (pictured – cracks highlighted in white) which necessitated the replacement of the protective glass.

Internally the dome of the cupola has been restored with new oak spliced to preserve the character of the original frame where possible and one upright has been delicately repaired in situ. Much of the facia have been replaced and



elements of the structure have been re-sheathed with intricate lead work. The cupola is beautifully capped by the gleaming re-gilded weather vane visible for many miles as a stunning land mark for all to see.

As well as the structural renovations, the cupola bell & hammer have been reset within their newly refurbished surroundings. The cupola bell, which is identified the listing as 'from old St Leonards Church in Corve Street' bears a faint time-eroded inscription, '1684 ALL PRAISES AND GLORY BE TO GOD FOR EVER'.

Councillors are delighted with the quality work to the cupola. The next phase of works will take place inside the Buttercross and involve extensive refurbishment of first floor ceilings to protect the historic interior of the Chamber, which affords a historically celebrated view of Broad Street, described as 'one of the finest streets in the country'.

BUTTERCROSS - Next Phase

A recent new collapse of part of the Buttercross ceiling, this time in the Town Clerk's old office, has come as a timely reminder of the work required to make the internal ceiling plaster safe and give this beautiful building a new lease of life.

The earliest that work can resume is the springtime, so this opens up a further opportunity to let the Town Council know what you want. We have good news of a £32,000 grant from Shropshire Council and a local community group that we are working in partnership with is hoping for an extra £50,000 for the Linney project.

To enable local people to express their ambitions, needs and priorities

To co-ordinate the actions of local councils, statutory, public, voluntary, community and private organisations

To focus these actions so that they meet community needs and ambitions within local resources

To secure funding for South Shropshire." This has not changed.

Ludlow Achievements 2004 - 2009


While not achieving all the aspirations of the Plan of 2004-2009, many have been achieved, in full or in part.. For example, South Shropshire District Council's support for the project, led to the opening of the pioneering BioDigester in 2005 a flourishing Farmer's Market, organised by Ludlow 21 is now held on two Thursdays a month and Dinham Millenium Green has become a much loved leisure area, thanks to the efforts of the Trust with financial backing from Advantage West Midlands and others.

Overall it has been 5 years of very substantial achievement, coming on top of 15 earlier years that saw vast strides in the amenities of the town. Ludlow and local people can justly be proud of the partnerships which have made so much happen.

Beginning to implement a new plan

We look forward to similar cooperative spirit creating even more improvements in the years ahead, inspite of the economic challenges currently facing the country. It requires enthusiasm, imagination and initiative to build a continuing prosperity for all residents to share.

The Interim Plan 2009-10 The ongoing work of the Town Council has led to the adoption of specific projects which have already been consulted upon, outside the framework of the Ludlow Future Plan 2010-15. These projects are:-



- 1. The refurbishment of the Market
- 2. The remaking of the Linney Play Area
- 3. The Castle Gardens enhancement plan. 4. The Buttercross refurbishment.

Ludlow priorities for 2010 - 2015

Ludlow Town Council can achieve very few of the objectives without working in partnership with others. | The priority areas are:-

1. Services for Young people, leisure, training, social development and jobs. This reflects social challenges within the area, and the reduction in various sources of funding for those currently organising activities for young people. It is also recognised that the provision of activities for young people reduces the possibility of antisocial behaviour.

 Services for the elderly, health, welfare, care and residential provision. This reflects the rapid rise in both numbers of the elderly, their relative increase in the population, and their increasing frailty as average age rises.
Services for all residents. This reflects requests we have received during consultation.

4. The economy. Ludlow area's dependence on tourism, retailing and farming related activities mean that jobs are often part time or poorly paid. It is important to help these sections of the economy flourish, while seeking to diversify.

5 The environment. Climate change and the threat of a decreasing oil supply make it necessary to reduce energy consumption, and provide beneficial alternatives.

6. Affordable housing. It is imperative to provide enough decent homes, at affordable rents or purchase price, for local people, as prices have risen particularly due to the inflow of the retired

7. The preservation and improvement of the town centre is vital, partly because of its exceptional beauty and heritage value, but also because the local economy is heavily dependent on tourism. We must therefore strive to protect and enhance the amenities of the town, and the vibrancy of the Town Centre.

8. The wide divisions in wealth and background found in the town make it important that the Town Council seeks ways to reduce division and create a very inclusive community. We must aim to increase opportunities for those who have any disadvantages, whether social, physical, mental or economic.

9. Transport has a unique part to play within several of the other priorities.

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HAVE YOUR SAY IN HOW WE SPEND £400,000

Ludlow as one of the key market towns in Shropshire has been allocated £400,000.

Local people will be able to influence decisions about how the money is spent by letting their town council know what they want – please use the form below.

The funding is available for capital projects that will generate income and are sustainable in the long term. Schemes which create employment will have more chance of success, but please remember the money can only be claimed for the capital element of the scheme. Examples you may consider include:

- Encouraging public services to share buildings and save running costs to allow investment in improving the services themselves.
- Enhancing existing markets in partnership with town councils and the private sector.
- Making towns more attractive by building parks, improving street furniture or refurbishing buildings.

Community groups have many opportunities to obtain grant funding from other funding streams. We can help with this – We have acquired over £139,000 this year for Community projects!
