We're so pleased that you've decided to come and visit us here at I udlow Museum at the Buttercross. Our little museum is owned and run by Ludlow Town Council

Let Ludlow's historic heritage unfold before your eyes! We're open Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Bank Holidays 10-4pm (closed between Christmas and New Years Day).

We have something for all ages to enjoy including interactive exhibits, a children's craft area and a handling area. Enjoy the fabulous views from the Buttercross along Broad Street, Church Street and the surrounding countryside.

## Our history!

Ludlow Museum was first established in 1833 and was originally housed in the Old Market Hall, which was demolished in 1887. Following several different locations, Ludlow Museum now resides in the Buttercross, a beautiful 18th century building.





Discover a wonderful selection of exhibits taking you through Ludlow's rich history.

From its fossils, the ancient Bitterley hoard, artefacts from Ludlow's medieval church and castle, elegant Georgian Ludlow, and exhibits depicting Ludlow at War and Peace.

Have a chat with our museum staff and enjoy our seasonal changing exhibitions. Much loved exhibits have included Children's Author, Malcolm Saville, Butterflies and Bugs from #TheWildEscape exhibit, Shropshire Historical Pageant and Reynolds of Ludlow.
